Thank you for attending your breast screening appointment recently. Your films have now been reviewed by our doctors. As explained in your invitation letter, screening is sometimes undertaken in two stages. Second stage screening is required in your case. The specific reason for this will be explained when you attend your appointment.

Possible reasons why second stage screening may be required:

- A clinical abnormality noted by you or the radiographer.
- Asymmetry of tissue – this is usually a normal finding.
- Overlapping breast tissue caused by the compression during your mammogram.
- Benign (that is not cancerous) areas that require further investigation for confirmation.
- Microcalcifications (small flecks of calcium) these are usually associated with benign conditions such as cysts.
- Suspicious areas or distortion that may be a sign of an early cancer.

The majority of women called for second stage screening do not have a cancer. If a breast cancer is detected early there is an excellent chance of making a full recovery.

During your appointment you will be seen by both male and female staff and chaperones are available.

What further investigations may be necessary at second stage screening

During your second stage screening other investigations may be necessary, where possible they will be carried out during that visit. These could include:

Clinical Examination: Where the clinician will examine your breasts with their hands and look for any changes in their natural shape.

Mammogram: Further mammograms may be required. This may only be necessary on one breast.

Ultrasound: This is completely painless and involves some gel being put on your breast then an instrument which produces and detects sound waves is passed over your skin to give an image of your breast.

Fine needle aspiration: This is a test in which some cells are removed from your breast using a fine needle guided by the ultrasound machine. The cells will be examined under the microscope. Another appointment will be given for you to receive the results the following week. You may experience some bruising afterwards.

Core biopsy: This is similar to a fine needle aspiration. The ultrasound or mammogram machine is used to guide the doctors to the exact area to be biopsied. Local anaesthetic is given to numb the area and make the procedure more comfortable. A small piece of breast tissue is removed using a special needle. Some bruising may occur for up to a week after the procedure. An appointment will be given to you before you leave the unit, for you to receive the results the following week.

What will these further investigation show

Depending on the results of your additional investigations you may:

- Be reassured and returned to the National Breast Screening Programme for mammograms in three years time.
- Require earlier screening, for example in one years time.
- Require excision of an abnormality for diagnostic purposes.
- Require further treatment. If this is necessary you will see a Doctor and a Breast Care Nurse who will explain the treatment and provide additional written information.

All imaging from the second stage screening is reviewed by a further doctor. Very rarely you may be recalled for third stage screening.

Please feel free to ask questions if there is anything you do not understand.

You are welcome to bring a partner, relative or friend with you to your appointment.

9 out of 10 women called back for second stage screening do not have breast cancer.

Access to Health Records

As a patient undergoing tests as part of a diagnostic procedure information about you may be accessed by other healthcare professionals. It is normal practice in these circumstances for your consent to be implied as part of your agreement to have the test or tests performed.

Accidental over exposure of radiation

Despite all safeguards, medical exposures can occur where the actual dose is greater than was intended. The regulations governing these exposures are either IR(ME)R 2000 or IRR 99.

In the event of an over exposure the incident will be reported to the Radiation Protection Advisor. It will be down to the discretion of the RPA as to whether there is a clinical requirement to inform any patient of an overexposure.
