Description of Service and Client Group	The Pharmacy department supplies a comprehensive range of pharmaceutical services for in-patients, out-patients, patients waiting to go home, wards, doctors, nurses, GP's, community clinics, other hospitals/trusts and the general public. Also involved in teaching, within the pharmacy department, to patient groups and to clinical staff.
Description of related services & Client group	Daily services include : Procurement, Supply and Distribution of Medicines trust wide, Aseptic services (including the preparation of patient specific doses for chemotherapy and supply of total parenteral nutrition). Admission through to Discharge of patients – providing help and advice to patients in all aspects of their medicines throughout their stay. The pharmacy teams on wards work closely with doctors and nurses providing clinical pharmacy support and to other multidisciplinary professionals on the wards – we promote multidisciplinary team working. Pharmacy is responsible for the Medical Gases Service. Pharmacy provide a Medicines Helpline service, operating from within the Integrated Care Hub to answer questions from patients who have medication queries. Follow up calls are also made to patients after discharge, which will form part of the Medicines Optimisation in Vulnerable patients on discharge home service. Introduction of innovative and continual improvement of technology to improve safety and quality in medicines management (see websites below). The Pharmacy department provide the Out-patient and Home Parenteral Infusion Therapy Service (OHPIT), which also includes the Midline and PICC line insertion service. The Pharmacy department is responsible for all medicines logistics in the hospital. (This list is a snapshot of the services provided by the pharmacy department).

Expectations during placement	Pharmacy professionals should follow the Standards of conduct, ethics and performance set by the General Pharmaceutical Council. https://www.pharmacyregulation.org/sites/default/files/standards_of_conduct_ethics_and_performance_july_2014.pdf Pre-registration trainee pharmacist – (MPharm degree awarded prior to starting pre-registration). Over a period of 52 weeks, developing their practice to meet a set range of performance standards, under supervision, guided and verified by their tutor, and then if eligible, sit the registration assessment. Pre-registration trainee technician – over a period of two years, complete both a General Pharmaceutical Council approved competency-based qualification and a knowledge –based qualification. Also, two years consecutive work-based experience under the direction of a pharmacist to whom the trainee is directly accountable.
